## Our Cornerstone

You can find the cornerstone of Westminster Presbyterian Church on the eastern edge of our sanctuary building on State Street. The date on it reads **1861**. What comes to mind when we think of 1861 is the onset of the Civil War. War must certainly have been on the minds of the people who gathered in Albany on April 17th to break ground on the building of our sanctuary. Just five days before, Confederate forces had fired upon Fort Sumter. On April 15, newly-inaugurated President Abraham Lincoln issued a call for 75,000 new Union soldier volunteers. The Civil War had begun.

We sing

"Christ is Made the Sure Foundation,

Christ the head and cornerstone."

We can only speculate about what people were thinking at the ground breaking ceremony for State Street Presbyterian Church, as it was called then. But certainly we know that they were taking a leap of faith at a time when the nation was entering headlong into war.

Westminster has a history of taking on great tasks during critical moments in history. After a disastrous fire in 1928, the congregation rebuilt the sanctuary at the onset of the Great Depression. These examples inspire us, as we are facing our own challenges of war and economic recession, to bring a similar resolve to the living of our days and to our service in the name of Jesus Christ •


## Congregational Brunch

**Our Good Friday** Tenebrae service will focus on a series of organ Meditations on the Seven Last Words of Christ by John Huston (1915-1975). The composer, a pupil of Clarence Dickinson and Harold Friedell, was an organist in New York City and taught at Union Theological Seminary's School of Sacred Music. His seven Meditations for Good Friday were composed in 1956, and reflect the drama and deep emotion surrounding Jesus' last moments on the cross. Following each meditation, the choir and congregation will sing a stanza of Delores Dufner's recent hymn, "Faithful Cross, O Tree of Beauty," a modern rendering of an ancient church song set to the familiar hymn tune PICARDY. The choir will also sing an anthem by the contemporary British composer Colin Mawby, as well as a musical setting of the Reproaches by Tomas Luis de Victoria. The service will end in silence and darkness. We invite you to be present for this deeply moving worship experience •

**This** past December, Westminster Church was the happy recipient of a generous gift from members Jim Cronen and Robin Thomas: a two-manual French-style harp-


sichord. The instrument was built during the 1970s from a kit purchased from the shop of the renowned Boston harpsichord builder Frank Hubbard. Over seven feet long, it has three registers (or sets of strings), two of which play at unison pitch and one which plays an octave





higher, a coupler which permits both keyboards to be played at once, and a buff stop which partially dampens the strings to create a gentle, lute-like effect. Many Westminster members will recall hearing this instrument once before, when it was played at the church about three years ago during a Sunday morning service at which the choir sang some baroque Advent cantatas, accompanied by a small chamber ensemble. This new instrument will provide the church with many more opportunities for creative music-making, both in worship services and at concerts. We are very grateful to Robin and Jim for the gift of this splendid instrument! •


