We live on this side of the resurrection.

Christ has died. Christ has risen. Christ is alive. And because Christ lives, we too, shall live.

Lent teaches us at what great price we were bought; what great sacrifice it took to ransom us from the bonds of death. The Lenten vigil of the passion of Jesus Christ brings depth and meaning to Easter morning. Once we have witnessed the last hours of Jesus' life, we know that Jesus cried real human tears, shed real human blood, and died a real human death. And so Easter becomes a true victory of life over death.

But our faith does not stay on Good Friday. We are compelled to move forward to Easter Sunday, to the empty tomb and beyond. Christians are Easter people, and we are to live as people who have been given the victory through the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

The New Testament is rife with affirmations of victory: "we are more than conquerors through him who loved us," writes the Apostle Paul. He writes to the church in Corinth, "Death has been swallowed up in victory ... Thanks be to God who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

We can live confidently even in the shadow of death because the grave is not our eternal resting place. Easter people believe that the God who made us will care for us beyond the bounds of our vision, even to eternal life. The victory of life has been won \bullet

Pastoral Reflections:

I have been to some miserable Easter Sunrise services - miserable because of the weather. When I was in college in Chicago, we had our sunrise service on the beach looking out on Lake Michigan. They don't call it the Windy City for nothin'!

Yet, there's something about the Easter Sunrise service.

When worship is inside, we go to every effort to make things comfortable, though some straight-backed pews may not give one that impression. We have heat or air-conditioning in our sanctuaries, sound systems that allow people to hear and often a raised chancel or pulpit in order to see the worship leaders.

The Sunrise service is none of these things. Bleary-eyed worshipers gather in the cold, often the very cold, with no sound system and their programs flapping in the wind. Sometimes it rains heavily or is so cloudy that the service is completely in the dark from beginning to end.

Yet, there's something about the Easter Sunrise service.

On Easter morning, we are completely out of our element, we 21st century Northern Hemisphere Christians who like to be in control. This worship service is purposefully not about our comfort level but about the message and the experience.

Perhaps we need to be reminded that worship is not about us, that the Gospel is uncomfortable, that God does not dwell in a building.

May the Sunrise service dwell in *us* this Easter season.

• On **Palm Sunday**, our morning service of word and sacrament will open with the traditional procession with palms and will include festive hymns as well as musical offerings by the Westminster Choir, the Westminster Children's Choir, and the Westminstrels Handbell Choir.


• On **Maundy Thursday**, the Westminster Choir will again lead our hymn singing, and will present anthems by Maurice Duruflé and John Stainer.

• The choir will return on **Good Friday night**, to guide us through a unique service of **Tenebrae**. This service will focus on the text of the ancient Good Friday antiphon known by its opening Latin words, Adoramus Te: "We adore You, O Christ, and bless you; for by your cross and precious blood You have redeemed the world." Over the centuries, these words have been set to music by countless composers. Our choir will sing several of these musical settings in alternation with scripture readings describing the final hours of Jesus' earthly life. Throughout the service, a slideshow of artwork depicting Christ's passion will complement the music and the readings.



• Finally, on Easter morning, we will be joined by the Catskill Brass and Timpani, for a joyous celebration of the resurrection. The sacrament of the Lord's Supper will be observed, and the service will close with the joyous strains of the Hallelujah Chorus. We hope you will be with us as we journey together from Palm Sunday to Easter.

AL FEDAK AND WESTMINSTER'S ORGAN ON NPR

ORGAN RECITAL BY CRAIG CRAMER: APRIL 13

At 7:30 PM on Friday evening, April 13, organist Craig Cramer will perform a solo recital on Westminster's historic Skinner organ. Dr. Cramer, professor of organ at Notre Dame University, is one of the most widely-traveled organists of his generation. With degrees from Westminster Choir College and Eastman School of Music, he has performed in 44 of the United States, and throughout Canada and Europe, where he has given concerts on nearly every important and historic organ. He has recorded several highly-reviewed CDs, and recently performed the complete organ works of J. S. Bach in a series of 18 recitals. His program at Westminster will include music of Bach, Mendelssohn, and Sowerby, as well as lesser-known works by Ethel Smyth, Toni Zahnbrecher, and Auguste Fauchard. A freewill offering will be received, and refreshments will follow the concert. Come and hear one of America's finest organists on one of America's finest organs!

is where Margaret Augusta Boulton, our beloved Meg Elbow, was born.

Despite hardship, the Boulton children would be well educated. At twelve, Meg rode on a "passenger boat" to England and remained there for ten years, earning a degree in early childhood education, and commencing a life of adventure. World War II broke out, and in 1943 Meg returned to Canada where various jobs sustained her until she left for the US several years later.

Meg attended Columbia University where she caught the eye of Matthew Elbow, a doctoral student. They married in 1947. When Matt accepted a teaching job at Albany State Teachers College, they moved to an apartment here. Another tenant, whom Dr. Welles visited frequently, made introductions, and Dr. Welles urged Meg and Matt to "try" Westminster. They joined in 1950, became Elders, Deacons, teachers, "Cooks and Bottle Washers," - Pillars of the Church!

Soon, they moved to Delmar and raised their three daughters. With grants from the College, Matt traveled to the Middle East to teach, and his family was with him - a year in Beirut, a year in Turkey. Over the years they traveled the globe.

Meg's life, far from easy, has been rich with blessings; she's had struggles, hopes and victories. She says that her "mantra" (from the Gospel of Mark) is "Lord, I believe, help my unbelief." Her "crutch is the ability to shut out bad thoughts." •


