THE TONGUES OF ANGELS

". . . Jesus said to them 'Do not be afraid . . . " Matthew 28:10

"What shall it be? What shall we choose: to live half alive and preserve the illusions of a Good Friday world, or live fully alive the Easter truth that Christ is risen, love never dies, not with God, not even with us, and because Christ is risen we too are risen?" William Sloane Coffin

On Easter, we proclaim our Easter faith: "Christ is risen! Christ is risen, indeed! Alleluia!" That is the essence of the Easter message, and it has a corollary: "Do not be afraid." Our most fearsome foe in life is death, itself, and so on the day when death is defeated, we can abandon our fears and embrace hope. Easter is a day when we are set free from fear, so that we may become fully alive and live boldly and love boldly. We can say along with the Psalmist: "The Lord is my light and my salvation, whom then shall I fear? The Lord is the strength of my life, of whom shall I be afraid?"

Whenever God sends messengers to the world, the people to whom they are sent cower and recoil in fear. The first thing the angels then need to say is: "Do not be afraid." They knew the poor mortals quaking before them would be able to hear none of their message unless they were drawn out of their paralyzing fear.

Walter Brueggemann, perhaps the premier Biblical scholar in America today, once addressed a group of clergy from big steeple churches. This was a fairly distinguished and sophisticated gathering. As told by John Buchanon, who was present among the clergy, Brueggemann laid out the Gospel in the simplest of terms:

"Remember when you awoke in the middle of the night as a child and were certain that the shadows outside your window were some kind of terrible monster, and the creaking of the stairs assured you that something awful was about to happen, and you cried out, and your father or mother appeared in your room and took you in his or her arms and said the most important words in the world, "Don't be afraid. It's all right!""

When you tell someone, "Don't be afraid," then you are speaking in the tongue of angels; but as Paul so eloquently writes, "If I speak in the tongues of mortals and angels but have not love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal." Even so, in order to be truly good news, we must say these words with the attitude of love, and with the assurance of presence. Then, people who hear our testimony will know that "love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends."

Love never ends.

If love never ends,

then what possibly is there left in this world to fear? Easter morning disperses fear as surely as the sunrise disperses the dark •



William Van Antwerp Waterman, Jr.

(At the close of 2012, Westminster received a bequest from William Waterman in the amount of \$205,000. People have asked to know more about the person who made such a generous gift. Patricia Trudeau has been kind enough to share some memories of her friend, Bill.)

Bill Waterman grew up on State Street in Albany. He and his parents were members of Westminster. He was graduated from Boys' Academy, attended Taft School and Yale University. In World War II, he served as a paratrooper in the 82nd Airborne, and was injured in a jump in Southern France.

After the war, he attended Trinity University in Hartford, Connecticut, and then set out for Edinburgh, Scotland for further studies. He then enrolled at Princeton Theological Seminary.

Bill was active in the Christian ecumenical movement. He served as an interim minister at the U.C.C. congregation in Schoharie. Bill ran for the Albany County legislature in 1969.

He loved FOCUS, Westminster's liturgy and music, and the Men's Bible Study group. Rick Spalding remembers that Bill had an avid theological appetite. People who knew him saw a man of very devout faith. He came to Wednesday night pot luck dinners sharing herbs from his garden in Berlin, New York, where his family had a farm.

Bill Waterman died December 20, 2009 in Canaan, Connecticut. His memorial service was held at St. John's Church in Williamstown, Massachusetts on February 13, 2010. Bill was a kind, caring and sensitive man. We all liked him very much •

BRUCE NESWICK ORGAN CONCERT: APRIL 12

The year 2013 marks the tenth anniversary of the re-installation and re-dedication of Westminster Church's fine Skinner pipe organ. To celebrate this occasion, several special events have been planned, the first of which will be a recital performed by concert organist Bruce Neswick, at 7:30 PM, Friday, April 12.


Bruce Neswick is one of America's major talents in the field of organ performance and is especially noted for his superb skill at improvisation, which has won him three first prizes—at the 1989 San Anselmo Organ Festival, the 1990 Boston American Guild of Organists' national convention, and the 1992 Rochette Concours at the Conservatoire de Musique in Geneva, Switzerland.

Bruce Neswick is associate professor of organ at the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music and was previously director of music at the Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine in New York City. He was formerly the organist and choirmaster of St. Philip's Cathedral in Atlanta for many years. Prior to his appointment in Atlanta, he was the assistant organist-choirmaster and director of the Cathedral Girls' Choir at the Washington National Cathedral as well as the director of music at St. Albans School for boys and the National Cathedral School for Girls. These appointments followed tenures as organist and choirmaster at Christ Church Cathedral in Lexington, Ky.; Holy Trinity Anglican Church in Geneva, Switzerland; and St. Paul's Cathedral in Buffalo, N.Y.

A native of Washington State, Mr. Neswick holds degrees from Pacific Lutheran University and from the Yale School of Music's Institute of Sacred Music.

As a recitalist, he has performed extensively throughout the United States and Europe and been featured at national and regional conventions of the American Guild of Organists. His playing is widely recognized for its incisiveness, vitality, and expressiveness.

The Bible for nearly 2,000 years has formed the grounding for both Christianity and the values of Western civilization. Yet today many church members aren't very knowledgeable about the Bible. In November 2011 Presbyterian Research Services developed a 40-question survey to measure Biblical literacy among a representative group of Presbyterians. Test yourself with this sample: (answers below *)

EASY QUESTIONS

- 1. What is the first book of the Bible?
- 2. Which biblical figure is most closely associated with leading the exodus from Egypt?
- 3. Who said, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands...I will not believe"?
- 4. Where was Jesus baptized?

HARD QUESTIONS

- 5. Which book says "If a man commits adultery with wife of his neighbor, both the adulterer and the adulteress shall be put to death"?
- 6. "Happy is everyone who fears the Lord, who walks in his ways" is found in which book?
- 7. Which of Paul's letters says, "There is no longer Jew or Greek; there is no longer slave or free; there is no longer male or female; for all of you are now one in Christ Jesus"?
- 8. Which Gospel tells of Jesus driving the money changers out of the temple near the beginning of his ministry?

How did you do? Want to do better and learn more? Plan to enroll in a new adult education course at Westminster next fall called Discovering the Bible: a New Generation, taught by Parish Associate Paul Randall.

The class will meet weekly for 30 sessions beginning Thursday, September 5th at the church. Cost for resource book: \$30. Based on the "Kerygma" study materials, this course will be a beginning survey of the Bible as a whole. It will explore biblical people, events, ideas, and places throughout the Old and New Testaments, through reading, reflection, discussion, and application.

A preview of the Kerygma approach will be offered immediately this month, beginning Thursday, April 4 at 5:30 at the church. It will be a 6-week program, "Introduction to Biblical Studies" (cost: \$12). For more information, contact Paul Randall or go to www.kerygma.com.

The annual Congregational Brunch will be held on Sunday, April 14, following the worship service. Plan to attend with all your family for this time of good food and fellowship.


CRIME VICTIMS MEMORIAL


