So when I arrived at seminary I was delighted to discover the lectionary and the liturgical calendar. (I had never heard of Maundy Thursday until seminary!)

Epiphany is the season we are now in.

I remember loving the season of Epiphany. I think maybe because the word itself was fun to say: "Epiphany!" Epiphany is the season between Christmas and Easter when we observe the ways in which Jesus revealed himself to the world: the visit of the Magi, his baptism, the calling of disciples, and the teachings and healings of his early ministry.

Epiphany is the season we are now in, or at least this season used to be called Epiphany. Now, for some reason, our lectionary refers to it as "ordinary time".

What a let down! Why should any season in the church year be regarded as "ordinary"?

Read ahead about the events in the coming weeks at Westminster. I invite you to experience, not just an "ordinary" February, but may you find at Westminster an "extra-ordinary" Epiphany •

Pastoral Reflections:



One of my first encounters with theology was reading Paul Tillich's *The Courage to Be* during my freshman year in college. Although it was way over my head, I remember enjoying it immensely. Tillich presents us with a choice between courage and despair, and urges us to live in a meaningful way in spite of the reality that

we will always be unsure of meaning.

This past month, our Second Hour adult class has been talking about values as we prepare to write a *values statement* for the congregation. What are our values? Compassion, acceptance, respect, tolerance, diversity, community, hospitality, kindness, and integrity were some of the predominant words that emanated from our discussion.

"This is not the moment to lament ... courage means taking risks."



When Pastor Frances and I picked our four words for values, we were surprised and pleased to discover we had one value in common: courage. The church must be courageous as we face an uncertain future. The main-line denominational churches are all getting smaller, and Westminster has been a part of this trend. This has produced all kinds of anxiety and hand wringing among Presbyterians. But this is not the moment to lament.

I believe this is a moment of opportunity for Westminster if we have the courage. Courage means taking risks. Courage means embracing a spirit of experimentation. At a time when no one really knows what will work, we should be throwing everything we can at the wall to see what sticks. Courage, then, is the willingness to make mistakes, the willingness to fail.

Who knows what the church will look like in the years to come? In an age of radical change, we need to be ready to adapt and be surprised ourselves by what can and could happen. This is our venture. May we have the courage to be the faithful church today, so that we will have the courage to become the church that God intends us to be in the future.

May God grant us wisdom, grant us courage, for the facing of these days •

The New
Presbyterian
Hymnal

As many of have served as a member of 2008, I have served as a member of the PCOCS (a.k.a. the "Peacocks"), the committee charged with developing a new hymnal for the Presbyterian Church USA. Since then, the PCOCS has gathered four times each year at the Presbyterian Center in Louisville, Kentucky, for meetings which lasted three to four days at a time. At the committee's final meeting in January, the contents of the new hymnal were finalized, and the committee sang through the entire book in order over 800 hymns and songs - a process which took about 30 hours! To be perfectly honest, we did not sing every stanza of every hymn, but this was the first time the committee had a chance to see how all the pieces of the new hymnal fit together, and the results were both impressive and gratifying. The new hymnal will be a remarkably rich resource of congregational song. And it now has a name: Glory to God: the Presbyterian Hymnal.

The contents of the new hymnal will be organized in a unique fashion, outlining the narrative of salvation history from Genesis to Revelation. There will be at least one musical setting of each psalm from the revised common lectionary, with an emphasis on metrical, rather than responsorial, psalms. There will be much new musical material: traditional hymnody, contemporary praise songs, spirituals, music from Taizé, and global song. (Yes, "Da n'ase" will be in the new hymnal!) But there will also be lots of familiar music as well. In fact, fully 60% of the contents of our current hymnal will be retained. This "old" material will comprise about 40% of the new book. In addition, a number of "heart songs" from the maroon Hymnbook of 1955, which were deleted from our 1990 hymnal, are being re-introduced, in response to the many requests received by the committee. The new hymnal will also include 30 pages of prayers and liturgies, as well as new, singable service music for congregations.

The two most frequently-asked questions about any new hymnal are (1) "What color will it be?" and (2) "How big will it be?" (In other words, will the book be too big to fit into our pew racks?) I'm glad to be able to finally answer both questions: First, the book will be available in two colors: red and purple. And second, even though the new hymnal will have 200 more hymns than our current book, it will be no larger, thanks to recent advances in paper technology, which yield thinner, more opaque pages.

As word spreads that the hymnal project is nearing completion, excitement is growing around the country. A new sampler of 50 hymns from the book is being prepared for circulation throughout the denomination; this will be released in a few months, and we can look forward to singing from it soon. The hymnal's contents will be presented to General Assembly for endorsement in July, after which production work will get underway in earnest. The new hymnal will be available in the fall of 2013, but special, attractive pre-publication offers are already in place which will make the hymnal a very affordable purchase.



FACE Africa's fourth project implemented at the Hope Mission School in the Bernard's farm community in partnership with the Westminster Presbyterian Church and the Voss Foundation was dedicated on Monday, December 12, 2011 and keys turned over to the school and community.

The goal of the project was to bring improved access to clean water, sanitation facilities, and hygiene practices to students at HMS and residents of surrounding communities in Bernard Farm.

Items funded and completed include:

- 40 ft hand-dug well + construction of a handpump
- Construction of a 6-compartment latrine + handwashing station and storage rooms
- Formation of a school health club
- · Pump mechanic training
- WASH Service Management Committee

Pastor Boniface Diggs, founder and principal at the school opened the dedication ceremony by stating, "This project is life-saving for

the school and community, and we are so thankful to all of our

partners and the individuals who made it possible". Dr. Brahima D. Kaba, commissioner at the Liberia Land Commission and a FACE Africa Advisory Board Member who was also in attendance stressed the need for government to join its partners in providing clean water for communities throughout Liberia. He also said that Liberia has more water resources per capital than any other country in West Africa,

but expressed regret that only 30% of Liberians or less have access to safe drinking water and improved sanitation. An elderly woman responsible for cooking and taking care of younger students at the school was ecstatic about the project. She said even more important than food, was water and kept repeating the phrase "water is life, water is life".


