

PASTORAL Reflections

GOSPEL ECONOMICS

We live in a world that professes scarcity. There is only so much to go around. Our resources are limited and quickly depleting. We can't afford health care for all, quality education for all, food and shelter for all. To provide these basic needs for everyone would bankrupt us. So we are told. Our supply and demand curves require a small supply at the high-end. Our pyramid graphics require that the highest levels come to a point. The few elite thrive on the principle of scarcity.

As far as the world is concerned, wealth is a zero-sum game: only one number can win the lottery. One person's fortune means it is less likely that others will find fortune for themselves. But this is not what the Gospel says.

The Gospel is never either/or. It is always both/and. Jesus said, "I have come to give life, and give it abundantly." The abundant life Jesus is talking about means that there is always enough grace to go around, that the store of God's goodness is never emptied. Since grace is always overflowing, since God always gives us more than what we could or might ever imagine, then we can more than afford to be generous.

The Gospel is always both/and.

The temptation is to hoard our wealth and our resources, to keep hold of what we possess. That makes sense according to the way of the world. But it is not living the Gospel. The temptation in lean times such as these is to tend to our own concerns, and put a hold on our generosity towards others until the day prosperity returns. But the needs of the world have not abated; they have only increased. At a time when many among us have lost much of our savings, are we going to allow circumstances to steal our generosity as well?

The Gospel of Jesus Christ draws us beyond our family to our neighborhood, out of our neighborhood and into the city, out of our city and into the countryside, beyond the near country, and to the ends of the earth. We are all knit together into God's family. We are brothers and sisters to one another in ways beyond our imagining. And God never picks between any of God's children, never nation against nation. In the kingdom of God, it is never a case of either/or; it is always both/and •

GREAT MUSIC and a SILENT FILM

Westminster Church's 2013 series of organ concerts, celebrating the tenth anniversary of the restoration of our church's E. M. Skinner pipe organ, will continue on Friday, June 7, at 7:30 PM, with a wonderful recital by Michael Britt.

A native of Baltimore, Michael Britt studied at Peabody Conservatory with some of the country's finest organists, including Thomas Spacht, Donald Sutherland, John Rose, and John Walker, and was a finalist in the prestigious Arthur Poister competition held at Syracuse University. He has served churches in the Baltimore area since 1981, and last year was appointed Minister of Music at Baltimore's Brown Memorial Park Avenue Presbyterian Church, where he follows the legendary John Walker, and plays a Skinner organ very much like our own.

Michael Britt is a remarkable performer who is equally at home in both the classical and theatre-organ worlds. He has performed at the Cathedral of Notre-Dame in Paris, and studied at the Paris Conservatory with Marie-Louise Langlais. As a theatre organist, he has performed widely throughout the US, on Public TV, and for the Library of Congress National Film Registry's silent film collection.

His concert at Westminster will incorporate some very special features: including colorful works by Edward Elgar, Paul Halley, David



Schelat, and Clifford Demarest, and the world premiere of Al Fedak's "Scherzo Ostinato on a Theme by Thomas Ravenscroft," which was written especially for Mr. Britt.

The program will conclude with a screening of the 1920 Buster Keaton silent film classic "One Week," with Michael Britt improvising an original organ accompaniment.

This promises to be a very enjoyable and entertaining event: plan to attend and bring guests! As always, admission is free, an offering will be received, and refreshments will follow the concert. Don't miss it! •



DISCOVERING THE OLD TESTAMENT



In 1916 when Europe was embroiled in World War I, theologian Karl Barth wrote an essay "The Strange New World of the Bible." He said, "There is a river in the Bible that carries us away, once we have entrusted our destiny to it – away from ourselves into the sea." We look for it in history, but it is not our kind of history. We look for it in morality, but it is more shocking than any allegedly new morality – not industry, honesty, and helpfulness as we may practice them in our old ordinary world, but the establishment and growth of a new world, in which God and [God's] morality reign."

Twenty-four people were enrolled in a six-week Bible introductory course at Westminster this spring. Average weekly attendance was 17. We had a great time discussing how the Bible was written, translated, and passed down through generations to the 21st century.

In September Westminster will launch a two-year course "Discovering the Bible," exploring more deeply the content of the Old and New Testaments. During September and October, 2013, and January and February, 2014 we will focus on the Old Testament. We will study the New Testament in 2014-15.

This course will be based on the *Kerygma* series, "Discovering the Bible: A New Generation." It will be led by Rev. Paul Randall, DMin., Parish Associate at the church. Paul has led many *Kerygma* studies in Cincinnati and Delaware, Ohio.

The class will meet at the church 5:30-6:45 pm, for 7 Thursdays September 11-October 24; and for 8 Thursdays January 9-Ferbruary 27, 2014. Participants are expected to read assigned materials each week in advance. Total cost is \$30 for the resource book.




