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#### LENT

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus,
who, though he was in the form of God,
did not regard equality with God
as something to be exploited,
but emptied himself,
taking the form of a slave,
being born in human likeness.


And being found in human form,
he humbled himself
and became obedient to the point of death—
even death on a cross.

Philippians 2:5-7

We begin our journey in Lent with an appeal for humility. As Christ emptied himself (some translations render this, "made himself on no account"), so Paul encourages Christians to follow in His way by emptying ourselves in all humility.

We know what it is to encounter a person who is 'full of himself,' so we can easily imagine in contrast the virtue in emptying oneself. But do we really understand what that might look like? Have we ever encountered anyone, other than Jesus himself, who has attained the humility to which Paul calls us?

John the Baptist made a simple statement about Jesus: "He must increase, but I must decrease" (John 3:30). May this be for each of us a guide for our spiritual journey as we approach the cross upon which Jesus died •



#### LET THE SAME MIND BE IN YOU THAT WAS IN CHRIST JESUS

Humility is the theme of our Lenten worship. So right off the bat, I have a confession to make. I have an issue with the word 'humble.' It sounds wrong. Just look at the words with which it rhymes: mumble, grumble, fumble, tumble, bumble, jumble, crumble and stumble. Did I miss any?

These are all ungracious words that attach to a most gracious attribute. Their association has done some harm, I fear. As I picture a humble person I see someone who is a bit of a clod, someone who easily and often falls over himself. The character of Uriah Heep from Dickens' David Copperfield comes to mind, who said of himself, "I am well aware that I am the 'umblest person going." He used the veneer of humbleness as a way to gain power.

A person who mumbles and grumbles all the time makes you suspicious that maybe he is not all that humble. Being humble would make you a bit more content on whatever your circumstances may be, wouldn't it? I don't like the word 'humble.'


Another word that catches in my throat is 'obedience.' Not that obedience is a bad thing at all. Obedience is truly a virtue, but one that is often betrayed by authority that does not deserve obedience. We must be careful where and how we tell people to be obedient.

I had the immense honor to meet Dorothy Soelle when I was in seminary. Soelle was a German theologian who grew up in Nazi Germany. Her book, *Beyond Mere Obedience*, asserts that unquestioning obedience - in politics, in religion, and in gender roles -leads to disaster.

I prefer the term of "following Jesus" rather than the term "obedience." Disciples rightly question their master. As we follow Jesus we need to employ our every faculty and measure every footfall on our path. Doubt is not the opposite of faith, it is the tool that allows faith to grow into a more mature and profound way. Tennyson said it well, "There lives more faith in honest doubt, believe me, than in half the creeds."

#### 'Humility is being humble without all that bumble."

The word I embrace whole-heartedly is 'humility.' Humility is being humble without all that bumble. Humility is the quality I see in those I regard as closest to the saints (although they do not see themselves as saints at all). C. S. Lewis wrote: "True humility is not thinking less of yourself; it is thinking of yourself less."



Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper





## MUSIC AT WESTMINSTER

#### CHAMBER MUSIC IN FEBRUARY

What exactly is chamber music? According to the usual definition, it is music intended for performance by a small group of musicians, playing (or singing) one-to-a-part, and generally enjoyed by performers and audiences alike in small, intimate musical settings.

While Westminster's sanctuary can hardly be called small, it can certainly be experienced as an intimate place, a beautiful place where one can commune with one's own thoughts, with one's friends and companions, and with God. Spiritually, then, as well as acoustically, it is an ideal place to hear chamber music, especially because it is graced by three very fine keyboard instruments: our Mason and Hamlin grand piano, our Hubbard harpsichord, and of course, our Skinner pipe organ.

This month we will be treated to two very special concerts of chamber music, each quite different from the other, but both designed to inspire, edify, and delight.

On Thursday, February 12, at 12:00 noon, the Musicians of Ma'alwyck will perform a free preview concert in our sanctuary, featuring romantic music for organ, violin, and cello. Their 45-minute program will include works they plan to play at a full-length, 3:00 PM Valentine's Day concert at First Reformed Church in Schenectady. Their Westminster program will include several exquisite movements by Rheinberger as well as "Sharp Stones," a haunting new piece for cello and organ by Al Fedak. He will be joined by violinist Ann-Marie Barker Schwartz and cellist Petia Kassarova.

Then, on **Saturday, February 28**, the Capitol Chamber Artists will present a concert of music by black composers. Their program will include spiritual arrangements by Adolphus Hailstork (who grew up in Albany), rarely-heard works by William Grant Still and Dorothy Rudd Moore, and will also recreate a program played by the 18th-century black violinist George Bridgetower, a student of Haydn and colleague of Beethoven. CCA members are violinist Mary Lou Saetta, cellist André O'Neil, and Al Fedak.

Their full concert at **8:00 PM** will be preceded by a **7:00 PM** recital, and refreshments will be served at intermission. Admission is free to members and friends of Westminster. We hope you will join us for some wonderful music!

The month of March will give us three more opportunities to sample some wonderful music:




- Strout, Elizabeth: Abide With Me A minister in rural Maine struggles to regain his calling, his family and his happiness in the wake of profound loss.




