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Church Calendar Page 11 **Come join** us for the Lenten journey as we proclaim: "*The Lord's steadfast love endures forever.*" This is our theme for the upcoming season of Lent.

"Steadfast Love" is a translation of the Hebrew word *hessed*. Rabbi Jonathan Sacks gives as good a definition of hessed as can be found. "What is hessed? It is usually translated as 'kindness' but it also means 'love' -not love as emotion or passion, but love expressed in deed. Theologians define hessed as covenant love...Hessed is the love that is loyalty, and the loyalty that is love. It is born in the generosity of faithfulness, the love that means being ever-present for the other, in hard times as well as good; love that grows stronger, not weaker over time...Hessed is the gift of love that begets love." (To Heal a Fractured World, pp.45,46)

At one point Jesus says to the Pharisees, "Go and learn what this means: 'I

means: `I desire mercy (hessed), not sacrifice, acknowledge-

ment of God, not burnt offerings.'" This Lent we will go and learn about hessed. For Christians, God's covenantal love is supremely expressed to us through the life and death of Jesus, and hessed, as our own covenantal response to God, is expressed in our deeds of love and mercy •

Already renowned for their precision and their passionate per-





Cleap Drinking for the world's population (1.1 billion people) faces a massive public health problem - lack of clean drinking water. According to the World Health

Organization, over three million people die each year from water related illnesses such as cholera, dysentery and diarrhea. An alarming 90% of deaths are children under the age of five.

Westminster has an important con-

nection with Liberia. We have provided funds to help build the Hope Mission School, which serves 140 students. We have also provided funds for tuition scholarships and, most recently, to erect outhouses at the school. Like much of Liberia, however, the Hope Mission School and its surrounding community do not have safe drinking water. Many of the students live with chronic intestinal problems.

A small group at Westminster named, "The Water Committee", has begun researching organizations and other possible solutions to provide safe drinking water at the Hope Mission School. We would welcome participation by others as we explore how to solve the water crisis for the Hope Mission School and its surrounding community.

Our friend and church member, Felicia Kollie-Gambles, a refugee from Liberia, provides us with direct contact to that nation and




