## Pastoral Reflections:

A few Sundays ago, in the greeting line after church one of you (and I don't remember who) told me the story about Oscar Wilde. Wilde visited the South some twenty years after the Civil War. One of his stops was in Charleston, where one evening he was walking along the beach near Fort Sumter, and commented to a woman about how beautiful the moon was. "Ah, yes," she replied, "but you should have seen it before the war."

The Gospels, and all of scripture, are filled with marvels, mystery, and miracles, but some of these miracles have to do with what doesn't appear in the pages of scripture. Nowhere in the book of Acts do you ever hear any of the apostles say, "I wish Jesus were here." Now, that's a miracle!

Think about that for a second. Wouldn't you think at least once somebody would have been caught murmuring, "Jesus would know what to say right about now;" or "remember the good old days when our master used to take a few fish and loaves and turn it into a banquet for thousands?"

#### ...with God, there are no rear view mirrors

The apostles are never nostalgic. They never miss Jesus. They never miss him because they experience his presence with them in the Holy Spirit. They are not looking over their shoulders for the Master to step forward and take charge; instead, they are empowered by the Spirit to proclaim his presence in every situation before them. When we make our pilgrimage with God, there are no rear view mirrors. Jesus said as much when he said, "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God."

When we embrace nostalgia we are rejecting God's call to us to follow and serve God in our own time and place. There are times when we are called to a new location and a new practice of our faith. That often happens in a lifetime. But we cannot be called to another time. We cannot go back in time to serve God gladly. When it comes to serving God, we only have the present--a present where our faithful acts and witness work toward a future where God's will may be done on Earth as it is in heaven •

Celebrating Al Fedak has enjoyed a string of good news recently. On March 29, the Pingry School in Martinsville, New Jersey, awarded him its very first Alumni Arts Achievement Award in Music. The three other inaugural honorees were dancer/choreographer Miguel Gutierrez, artist/designer Harry Allen, and Al's classmate, Jon Sarkin, who took up art after suffering a brain injury, and went on to become a world-famous artist. Most of Al's family were on hand to attend the awards ceremony, including his brother and sisters, and Sue, Peter, and Ben. Pingry also commissioned Al to write a new school song for the school's 150th anniversary; for this Al collaborated with Mel Bringle (Chair of the Presbyterian Committee on Congregational Song), who preached at Westminster last year, and who produced the song's text.

> During Easter week, as announced in these pages last month, "Pipedreams," NPR's national weekly organ-music program, broadcast a recording of Al playing one of his works on Westminster's Skinner organ.

And one of Al's choral works was performed at Harvard Memorial Church on Easter morning. Harvard University had commissioned Al to compose the opening anthem for the Easter service at which the church's new C. B. Fisk pipe organ was inaugurated. Thus, the work was the very first choir-and-organ piece to performed with the new instrument. (It was also sung that morning here in Albany by our own Westminster Choir.) The new piece will also be featured in a PBS documentary about Harvard's new organ, which will is scheduled to be telecast in early 2013 •

### "Where are all the young people?"


## "Why aren't they in church?" Sound familiar?

Though it was a cool day, we worked up a sweat shoveling, raking and weeding all in preparation for a community work day on Earth Day. We hope to return to the South End in the summer to continue work on one of their many vacant lot gardens.

The Young Adults are meeting monthly and growing fast. It is a great way to share food (there's always food) and what's going on in our lives •


