WHAT'S THE CHARACTER OF YOUR CHURCH?

"What's the character of your church?" asks the Rev. Rachel G. Hackenberg in a recent article of the same title. She describes three basic types of churches and invites her readers to decide which one they are.

The Easter Church asks church participants to be a "sanitized self." This is the kind of church where people are polished and put their best face forward, where the environment is controlled and not a hair is out of place. Across denominations or traditions, the Easter church puts forth the image that its people have things figured out.

The Good Friday Church welcomes you as a "wounded self." This kind of church acknowledges human failure and woundedness and can seem refreshing to those who feel constrained by the Easter church. While recognizing wounds, however, the Good Friday church does not move past them but stays with them. Hackenberg says that Good Friday churches "focus their identities on a specific need, and they set themselves up to be bandages for congregants' wounds."

Where do you think Westminster is these days?

The third type of

church, the **Pentecost Church** encourages people to be a "healed self." This church recognizes deep pain and death while pushing toward healing and a fuller life in Christ. It does not gloss over pain or wallow in it but seeks healing. Hackenberg describes the Pentecost church's relentless pursuit of healing that "the Spirit's unending call to fuller life in Christ." This type of church does not rest in the Easter or Good Friday mentality but constantly pushes for something more.

Perhaps you have been a part of congregations in the past that fit in one of these categories. Where do you think Westminster is these days?

In April, we had a healing service on Sunday morning. Did you bring a wound to God that day? Were you healed? A service of healing is one small way we attempt to bring healing to the brokenness of ourselves and the world. What are other ways?

Within the next weeks we celebrate Pentecost: the coming of the Holy Spirit. The Spirit continues to stir us up, not letting us get too settled or comfortable. I know that I long to be part of a Pentecost style community where I don't have to be defined by how put together I am or by the pains I have lived through. Instead, I can be defined by Christ's call to a healed life. •

SECOND HOUR ADULT FORUMS IN MAY

Fifty years ago this Spring, Martin Luther King, Jr. wrote his letter from the Birmingham Jail. The document can be seen as the manifesto of the civil rights movement of the 1950's and 60's, and its use of non-violent resistance as the means for social change. On Sunday, May 9th, our 2nd hour will be a public reading of King's seminal letter.

King had come to Birmingham to desegregate the public accommodations of that city. It was from this jail cell that King wrote the famous words: "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly."

Boston, Newtown, Virginia Tech, Tucson, Aurora, Nickel Mines, Oak Creek -the list goes on and on of cities and towns afflicted by mass shootings and mass murder. Does the heightened level of violence in America challenge Christians in our understanding of what it is to be a peacemaker? For our May 16th 2nd Hour Adult Forum we have scheduled a conversation about violence in America, and what might be the Christian response •


