When Jesus talks about piety, he is critical of those who pray, or fast, or give alms for show. Instead, Jesus says, do not let your right hand know what your left hand is doing.


Are we feeding people to feel good about ourselves or are we feeding people to end hunger? Motivation matters •




HARVARD COMPOSER/ORGANIST TO PERFORM AT WPC

Carson Cooman is something of a musical wunderkind. Barely 30 years old, he has already composed and published about 700 musical works, from hymn tunes to operas and symphonies, many of which have been performed and recorded by choirs, orchestras, soloists, and chamber ensembles all over the world. In fact, his works appear on about forty CDs, of which seventeen, on the Naxos label, are devoted entirely to his music. He is also an accomplished performer who specializes in modern organ repertoire. More than 130 compositions have been written expressly for him by over 100 composers around the world (including Al Fedak). Carson has given premiere performances of new works by some of the most distinguished contemporary composers, including Peter Maxwell Davies, Daniel Pinkham, Colin Mawby, and Emma Lou Diemer. He has recorded many of these works himself; his most recent CD, released this past June, is titled A Marvelous Love: New Music for Organ.

Born and raised in western New York, Carson Cooman holds degrees from Harvard and from Carnegie Mellon University. For the past several years he has held the position of Composer-in-Residence at Harvard's Memorial Church. For more information about Mr. Cooman and his work, visit www.carsoncooman.com.

His richly varied program will include music of Åberg, Hovhaness, Vasks, Sandresky, Asplund, and Nagel, as well as pieces by Westminster composers Al Fedak and Iteke Prins. After Session approves our new officers' training, the new officers will be ordained and installed on Sunday, January 6, 2013 ●




NEW OCCASIONS...NEW DUTIES

The first three Sundays in November, the 4th, 11th and 18th, during Second Hour following worship, David McMillan will present, "New Occasions, New Duties...", an historical survey of the three congregations that formed Westminster.

Second and Third Presbyterian Churches merged into Second Church in 1910. Eight years later, in 1918, when Second had a minister but no coal and State Street had coal but no minister, they merged into the State Street building, but only after Second insisted on a new name for the church - Westminster.

David will focus on the pastorates of William Buell Sprague who served the Second Presbyterian Church from 1829 to 1869, Ezra Abel Huntington who served Third Presbyterian from 1836 until 1854, and Kenneth Brakeley Welles who served Westminster from 1928 until his death, August 21, 1953. He will draw on resources from the New York State Library and the Library of the Albany Institute of History and Art as well as records on deposit in Westminster Church.

None of the buildings of these churches remains today, except for the reconstructed shell of the former State Street Church. Following the merger with State Street, the home of Second Church for more than a century on Chapel Street became a theater, night club, wrestling arena, roller skating rink and finally the Atterbury Playhouse before being torn down. Third's second home on Clinton Square ultimately became the site of the White Tower where generations of Albanians enjoyed coffee and hamburgers after attending The Palace, The Grand or The Strand theaters.



David invites you to join in recalling the tempestuous beginnings of Third Church when members of First and Second were drawn by the preaching of Homer Cumming, judged to be both a great preacher and insane. When the Presbytery would not accept him into membership, the church became Congregational! This was the history inherited by Rev. Huntington. We will also remember the revolution in Second Church, just as Rev. Sprague arrived, when a large part of the congregation departed to form Fourth Presbyterian!

We can see the changes in the faith and belief of our church

David also invites you to join him in considering the changes in both faith and practice from the times of the Exscinding Act of 1837 when several western presbyteries were thrown out of the denomination because of competing forms of revivals and opinions about slavery, until the present when many churches consider departing over issues of ordination and sexuality.

We will also read portions of Rev. Huntington's farewell sermons when he chastised his people for their despondency as the more affluent folk of Albany left Clinton Square and moved west toward the neighborhood where State Street was soon to be established.

By contrasting the Covenant signed by all new members of State Street Church in the nineteenth century and the sermons of Rev. Welles in the twentieth, we can see the changes in the faith and belief of our church.

By the way, David will be grateful if anyone can answer this questions - did Kenneth Welles have a doctoral degree? Everyone called him "Dr. Welles", but none can tell when or where this degree was awarded •


