PASTORAL Reflections

By Pastor James Reisner



For the first time in my 33 years of ministry, I will be on sabbatical leave this Fall. I am taking a season of study, reflection, and renewal for September, October, and November.

As I look at an extended time to reflect on my calling, I am planning on pursuing two major themes. First, I have contacted Dennis Tamburello, a professor of Religion at Siena College, to do some reading together on John Calvin's Geneva. Dr. Tamburello is a Franciscan whose doctoral thesis at the University of Chicago was on John Calvin. He has agreed to meet with me on six occasions. I am planning on studying Calvin's Geneva, how he practiced urban ministry and how the influence of his Geneva experiment eventually reached and found expression on American shores.



For the second project, I am planning on visiting a variety of Presbyterian congregations on the East Coast. I currently have an itinerary of churches reaching from Boston to Richmond, Virginia. These congregations share some common traits with Westminster, Albany. They all have a strong identity with their location as downtown city churches. My intention is to glean from these congregations some best practices in all facets of congregational life. More than that, I hope to gain more clarity on urban ministry and the role of the pastor in building up Christian community in the city.

This will be a test for me on setting boundaries. I am sincerely intending to stay away from Westminster. However, there will be one area where I will keep a hand in, and that is in the preparation for the capital campaign that will be introduced to the congregation in early 2015. In my absence, Frances Rosenau will ably act as Head of Staff and Moderator of Session. I know you will give her your support as she assumes more pastoral responsibilities at Westminster.

I want to thank the session and the personnel committee for their support in encouraging me to enter into what will be for me a special season of vocational renewal •

"FEARLESS GENEROSITY" FOR A KAIROS MOMENT

Pastor Reisner recently spoke about two Greek words for time -Kronos, meaning time measured like a clock in precise linear increments, and Kairos, meaning the crucial moment when time metaphorically goes off the clock. Kairos time can slow or stop; kairos time can be the perfect moment of bliss or the exact moment when events hang in the balance, the action taken that a split second before or after would have meant disaster or death but coming at just the right time it delivered success.

We believe that God is calling the Westminster community today in a kairos moment. This fall we need to seize this moment by making our annual pledge of time, talents, and treasure and by making an additional commitment to a million-dollar capital campaign. In keeping with both these goals, our stewardship theme this year is "Fearless Generosity."

Why do we need a million-dollar capital campaign? The Board of Trustees has determined that we need to make urgent repairs to the steeple and to the north wall of the church. These repairs will be extensive and expensive. A number of interior repairs also are necessary, including our toilet facilities. The result will be a safe, up-to-date facility that will better serve our church's mission.

The Apostle Paul in his letter to the church in Corinth said, "For if the eagerness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has - not according to what one does not have." Each of us is called to examine the blessings we have and weigh how God might use us and our gifts. We cannot give what we do not have. But if the eagerness is there, as Paul says, we can give more.

If each person in the congregation, in addition to an annual pledge, were to give a second equal pledge every year for five years we would reach our goal of raising one million dollars while maintaining our annual active ministry. Some can afford to give more and others less. Some may be struggling to maintain their current commitment. Others may have been waiting and watching, looking for the time and place where their help could make a real difference. For those who have been waiting, this is your kairos moment!

Together we can make a difference in the world. Together we can bring food to the hungry in Albany, clean water to our missions in Africa, shelter to our partners at Schuyler Inn, spiritual nurturing to our faith community throughout the Capital Region, and repair our building for future years of service. All that we have, and all that we do, we do in response to the blessings of God. Now is our kairos moment. Let us seize it together!

AUTHOR, AUTHOR!

Al and Sue Fedak traveled to Columbus, Ohio this past July to attend the national conference of the Hymn Society in the United States and Canada. Al helped lead a plenary session introducing our new hymnal, GLORY TO GOD, to conference participants, and he and Sue led a workshop on arranging hymns for handbells. Al also led a session at which he presented his fourth, and newest, published collection of hymn tunes called STONES UNTHROWN. Published by Selah Publishing Company of Pittsburgh, the book contains 27 new musical settings of texts by a variety of mostly contemporary hymnwriters.

Iteke Prins, another a Life Member of the Hymn Society, also attended the HSUSAC conference and presented her own newly-published hymn tune collection called A TREASURY OF FAITH. The book contains 64 hymn tunes, all of them settings of hymns for the lectionary by the poet Gracia Grindal. Iteke has been collaborating for several years with Ms. Grindal, a Lutheran, who is in the process of writing a hymn for each of the scripture readings and psalms in the 3-year Revised Common Lectionary. The book is published by Wayne Leupold Editions of Colfax, North Carolina.




