Pastoral Reflections: Partmership

The poet, "No man is an island, Entire of itself. Each is a piece of the continent, A part of the main." These are not the thoughts of an American. We are the nation of rugged individualism, of the self-made man. The iconic image of the American hero is Gary Cooper in "High Noon", fighting and defeating

the outlaws all by himself.

Recently, President Obama has come under criticism for saying to entrepreneurs that "if you've been successful, you didn't get there on your own... somebody along the line gave you some help. If you've got a business - you didn't build that. Somebody else made that happen."


In Christianity, there is no such thing as the self-made man (or the self-made woman). We have a creator to whom we are indebted beyond estimation. When it comes to matters of faith, no one can pull themselves up by their own bootstraps. Gratitude is perhaps the primary religious impulse.

We are not only indebted to God, but also we are indebted to one another. God calls us not to isolation but to community - and to partnership. This fall at Westminster we are exploring the possibilities of building partnerships with two congregations in Ghana: the Redemption and Greenwich Meridian Presbyterian Churches in the port city of Tema.

We will welcome to our congregation an old friend, the Reverend Alice Kyei-Anti and a new friend, Barbara Asempa, who is an elder at the Redemption Church. They are coming to Albany as missionaries to us and have much to teach weary American Presbyteries as they share their stories of vibrant congregations in Ghana.

As we ponder Ghana, we will also explore our partnerships in the Capital Region and particularly what connections we can make with AVillage, a new community organization in the South End of Albany.


across the nation and beyond in witness to the rich heritage of the Scottish Reformation.

New to WPC-Staff: Andrea Joy Holroyd


We welcome to our staff Andrea Joy Holroyd who is coming on board as our new Director of Christian Education. At its August meeting, Session acted to hire Andrea for a nine month contract that will span the 2012-2013 program year.

Andrea will be working 20 hours a week for us while she will also be enrolled in the Clinical Pastoral Education program at the Albany Medical Center. A graduate of RPI and Colgate Rochester Crozer Divinity School, Andrea is in the process of seeking ordination as a Minister in the Presbyterian Church (the new title is Teaching Elder).

Ms. Holroyd has been a member of Westminster since 2004, participating in the church choir and, of late, assisting with the youth group. She will assume leadership of our youth ministry while Pastor Frances is on maternity leave.

Andrea brings many strengths to her new position. Andrea has always attended city churches and is comfortable in our urban setting; she has previous experience working with special-needs children at Whispering Pines Preschool and her seminary education gives her a strong theological grounding in our theology and faith.

In this text, Paul tells the believers in Corinth the story of the Macedonians who didn't have material wealth but gave generously and gladly, giving both money and of themselves. As faithful stewards of the ministry and mission we share, we continue to undertake our ministry at Westminster with abundant joy and overflowing generosity.

This past summer Al and Sue Fedak traveled to Texas to

take part in the Presbyterian Association of Musicians' Worship and Music Conference held at Mo-Ranch near Hunt, Texas, where Al served as the 2012 Routley Lecturer in Hymnology. He and Sue planned and led the conference Hymn Festival with Al at the organ and Sue in the pulpit.

A few weeks later, they attended the PCUSA General Assembly in Pittsburgh, Al as a member of the Presbyterian Committee on Congregational Song (the Hymnal Committee) and as one of the organists for the Hymn Festival held at Pittsburgh's First Presbyterian Church. The GA unanimously approved the contents of the new Presbyterian Hymnal, called Glory to God, which will be released in 2013.

Finally, Al returned to Pittsburgh at the end of July, this time to lead another Hymn Festival at the annual conference of the National Association of Pastoral Musicians (the Roman Catholic church musicians' organization). The festival, which took place at Trinity Episcopal Cathedral, was called "A Celebration of Grace."


